LTS 101

Introduction to the Divine Liturgy

Course Credit: 3 Semester Hours

I. Course Description

This course is a topical approach to the Divine Liturgy. The Liturgy is studied as a vehicle for worship. This course describes: the Divine Liturgy's intricate connection with the Bible; basic rites such as censing, processions, the Sign of the Cross, etc.; the significance and meaning of Church architecture, fixtures, art, and vestments; and the general shape of the Liturgy as a procession into the Heavenly realm.

II. At the conclusion of this course, students will have:

- A. A framework of personal Christian development through liturgical life of the Church.
- B. A grasp of the inseparable connection between worship and faith. "Lex orandi, lex est credendi."
- C. An increased understanding of why we worship the way we do.
